BSTA 632: Biostatistics Methods II, Spring 2020

1. Background and Objectives

This is the second half of the methods sequence, where the focus shifts to methods for categorical and survival data.

Topics in Categorical include contingency tables and associated tests (excluding those covered in Methods I), generalized linear models for contingency tables, logistic regression, Poisson regression, nominal and ordinal response models, conditional logistic regression.

Topics in Survival analysis include survival distributions, hazard distributions, censoring mechanisms, and truncation mechanisms. Topics also include parametric and nonparametric methods for estimation and inference, including the Kaplan-Meier estimator, exponential and Weibull models, logrank tests, the generalized Wilcoxon test, the Cox proportional hazards regression and extensions to time-dependent covariates.
